The Admission process, starting from registration to admission, is fully computerised at the University and the College level 2. The process of fee payment for all students is fully digitalised at the University and the College level 3. When a student joins the college, the timetable of each semester is also available on the college website 4. The process of selecting Skill Enhancing Courses (SEC) and Generic Elective Courses (GEC) is also done digitally. The students are provided a link each semester, on which they can register for a course of their choice through their smart phones. 5. Monthly and semesterwise attendance of each student is also uploaded on the college website, whereby students and their parents can check it any time. 6. Internal assessment too is available on the college website and can be accessed by students when required. 7. Degree distribution to students is also done through online mode 8. Student elections too are held online 9. Registration for hostel is done through a link provided on the college website. Hostel fee is also paid online 10. We have classrooms with audiovideo facilities 11. Feedback from students, alumni, parents, nonteaching staff and employers is collected online 12. Faculty self assessment form is also filled online 13. To make the process of grievance redressal easy and student friendly, we have also provided a grievance redressal link to students on the college website, by which they can directly contact the Principal to share the problems they may be facing http:// vyomcafe.com/jdmcforms/student_grievanc e_form/ 14. Digital Sign board (LED Board) has been installed to apprise students about scholarships and notices for competitive exams like SSC and UPSC 15. CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

JDMC is affiliated to University of Delhi; the curriculum preparation of all the courses is undertaken by Departments at University level. Faculty members of JDMC contribute to Committees of Courses for Syllabus Revision and Planning. The revised CBCS syllabus is available on the college website and prospectus (http://www.du.ac.in/du/index.php?page=syllabi). To ensure that curriculum delivery is done in a timely fashion, timetables are made and distributed to the students and faculty . Classes commence from the first day of the academic session. College orientation programmes are held. Besides lectures and tutorials, many innovative methods are adopted for curriculum delivery. Some of them are: ? Project Based Learning -Students are assigned projects on topics of their choice. This method helps in developing focus, research and analytical skills. ? Group Discussions and brainstorming sessions are held on regular basis. Films/videos, business games, educational excursions, talks by academicians, quizzes are organized to enhance teaching. ? Multimedia techniques like Microsoft Office, Mathematica, Maxima, C++ are used to help students assimilate concepts. ? Software like LaTex and R are used to enhance the presentation, documentation and data analytical skills of students. ? Real world/Outdoor learning is also imparted to the students through field visits, industrial trips, internships, and workshops. ? Students also learn skills like translation in the Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) offered in B.A. Programme. Under this course last year, the students translated a film, Avengers into Hindi. Theatre in Education technique: Students through enactments not only learn process of creating and performing a dramatic script but also to critically examine texts and give expression to their analysis. ? JDMC has a mentoring system in place to help students negotiate their academic life. Student-faculty meetings provide another venue for discussion of grievances of all kinds, which can be about academics, infrastructure, canteen or interpersonal issues. ? JDMC takes mid-term exams/class projects seriously. ? Remedial classes are held for students who are slow learners or have missed classes while participating in extracurricular activities, sports, NCC or due to medical reasons. These classes are generally held in the last month of the term. ? Departments regularly invite scholars and experts to educate students about the innovations taking place in their field of study. ? Seminars and conferences are organised regularly by all departments to engage students' interest in different aspects to their subjects. ? In addition to this, we have a well-stocked library which also offers online databases for research. ? 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback is collected from all the stakeholders students, teachers, employers, alumni, and parents. The compiled feedback is scrutinized to address the problems that any of the stakeholders may be facing. For instance, students' feedback, taken through multiple modes like the monthly student faculty meetings and the feedback form that is filled at the end of the term, is collected and analysed to assess the aspects that need to be worked upon to improve the learning environment. Talks and lectures by experts are organised to fill the gaps in teaching and enrich the curriculum. If any student is unable to deal with academic problems, remedial classes are organised to provide extra academic support. These are held in the last few weeks of every academic session for weak students and students who have missed lectures due to sports and extracurricular activities. Mentoring is also done by faculty members to help students deal with studies and future academic course. Pratibha Centre for Competitive Exams was an initiative started in response to the students' desire to prepare for competitive exams within the environs of the college at reasonable rates. Many of our addon courses are made available to students in response to their wishes. Contact periods of the faculty members are provided to students in which they can meet and discuss any relevant issues. Infrastructure related issues are addressed immediately and a complaint register is maintained to ensure timely redressal of such grievances. Feedback is analysed directly by the Principal, who also seeks inputs from the administrative staff in the Monday morning meetings. Parents are encouraged to meet the faculty and get direct inputs about their wards from their teachers. The Student Union office bearers also contribute actively in providing information to and from students that pertains to the activities of the college, especially for the college cultural festival, Symphony. Any feedback received from the students as well as staff regarding canteen facilities, drinking water, washrooms, classrooms and other building infrastructure etc is dealt with promptly. Feedback is also collected from other stakeholders teachers, employers, alumni, and parents through online forms. Internal audit mechanism also serves as a kind of feedback. Janki Devi Memorial college formally started the mentor mentee system in 2018 2019, under which around 20 students are allocated to every faculty member to provide support in their studies and career paths. The faculty members periodically interact with students to analyse their intellectual and career interests and encourage them to pursue their goals. There are other modes of mentoring that are also used to provide sustained mentoring in all spheres of academic life, in addition to a formal mechanism like the mentormentee system. These include the Student faculty meetings that are held regularly by all departments in every semester to provide effective and immediate resolution of students' queries and grievances. This too is a formal mechanism for immediate

redressal of student issues, as all these meetings are minuted and efforts are made to immediately resolve issues. Faculty members are also available in the contact periods that have been officially provided in each timetable to ensure extra assistance and help beyond the scheduled lectures. The special remedial classes are held to enhance the academic strengths and reduce the weaknesses of students by the departments in addition to the regular semester wise remedial classes. Some departments also organize parent faculty meeting for effective mentoring of the students. Faculty members interact with parents to explain the strengths and weaknesses of their wards and offer counselling to improve their wards performance by focusing on requisite areas.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

University of Delhi has a provision of 25 marks for continuous internal assessment in each paper, a rule that is followed by JDMC because it is a constituent college of University of Delhi. Students are thus assessed on a continuous basis for this component. Evaluation for this component is made an integral part of the entire teaching and learning process to ensure that students are not assessed only at the end of the semester. Keeping the broad guidelines of the university in mind, faculty members have the liberty to choose how they wish to assess the students continuously. The progress of students is monitored through project submissions, presentations, quizzes, assignments, role plays, workshops, reports and writes ups on field visits etc. These activities are undertaken over the entire semester. Assessing students

over the entire semester gives them many opportunities to improve their performance and removes fear and undue pressure to ensure that they can perform at the optimum level. Efforts are made by the faculty members to return assignments, tests, tutorials, projects etc after evaluation in time, so that the students get an opportunity to learn from their mistakes. Wherever need is felt, students are given an opportunity to improve and resubmit their work for reassessment. In special cases, retests are also allowed for students who have missed tests due to medical issues or due to sports meet during the semester. Out of 25 marks, 5 marks are assigned for attendance as per the University guidelines, thus making attendance an important component of internal evaluation process. A minimum of 66.6 percent attendance is required as per the University rules. Students failing to score 66.67 percent in attendance are marked zero (0) out of five (5) while students with 85 percent or above attendance are granted 5 marks in internal assessment 84.9 percent to 80 percent gets them four(4) marks 79.9 percent to 75 percent attendance means three (3) marks 74.9 percent to 70 percent attendance means two (2) marks and 69.9 percent to 66.7 percent attendance is worth one (1) mark. Students are informed about this at the outset of the term.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

As a Delhi University affiliated college, the institution strictly follows the academic calendar of the University. The same calendar is also published by the college in its prospectus, web site and attendance registers to eliminate any confusion. The academic calendar includes the calendar for the conduct of examinations (provided by the University) and being an affiliated college, the same is followed by the institution for smooth working of the college. This academic calendar of the University is followed every semester that marks the beginning of the classes, the mid semester break, beginning of classes after mid semester break, the dispersal of classes for preparation of exams by students, the period for conduct of practical exams and the theory exams. The date sheet for the theory external exams is also sent by the University. It is prepared meticulously to avoid any clashes between papers. The same is adhered to by the institution. The dates for the internal assessment for every subject are fixed keeping in mind the curriculum and the students understanding of the subject. In house examinations are conducted on regular basis. In addition to this, if a student needs extra help, remedial classes are conducted by the respective teachers according to the students' requirements. The calendar for every academic session is followed strictly by the institution while keeping the needs of students in mind. All the guidelines by the University are duly followed by the institution. A Complaints Register is maintained to record any fault or deficiency noted by faculty, staff or students. The caretaker examines the register and takes necessary steps to overcome the deficiency. Electricians and plumbers are hired to remove the electrical or plumbing faults. After attending to the fault, the electrician/plumber report to the caretaker whether the fault has been removed or if they need some material to get the infrastructure in working order. The required material is purchased from open market and used to repair the damaged part. For maintenance of building, if any defect is brought to our notice, the same is examined by the consultant engineer. As per his advice, necessary steps are taken. Minor repairs are done through contractors. For major repairs, tenders are uploaded on the college website. The tenders received are examined by the consultant engineer, AO and the caretaker. Comparative statement is prepared and the job is allotted to L1 after approval of the competent authority. The building is examined from time to time by the Engineer and the Architect for structural stability. PABX System, CCTVs, R.Os, air conditioners, water coolers and generators are under AMC for their maintenance and proper utilization. Any fault in computers, projectors, audio system is examined by technical experts and necessary repairs done as per GFR, according to the cost involved. Sports and Library facilities are properly maintained and the required repair and renovation is done as per GFR. CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 - Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 - Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500

The college has a Staff Council comprising of all members of the faculty. The Council meets approximately four times in an academic year and collectively decides upon the course of action to be taken regarding the academic and administrative aspects of the college. In the last academic session, the Council agreed that apart from the remedial classes held every semester, it was important to work towards improving the results of the college by developing parity among students in terms of their performance. It was decided that introducing special mentoring classes would set higher achievement targets for both, the under achievers as well as the bright students. All faculty members have contact periods on their timetables, and so it was agreed that these could be used for mentoring. In accordance with this decision, a mentor mentee system was evolved and implemented, which is one example of participative management of the faculty in the academic domain. Every department has a student faculty meeting once a month (minimum four times in an academic semester), where grievances of students are redressed first at the department level, and then at the level of the administration and Principal, depending on the nature of the grievance. Students are a part of some important committees of the college, like the IQAC, the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) and the Canteen committee. They are also part of the Editorial Board of the college magazine. Every association/club/society of the college has student office bearers apart from the teachers, which makes their functioning democratic and participative to a large extent. The administrative staff is also a part of the IQAC, the ICC, the Purchase Committee, the Hostel Core Committee, the Canteen committee and hence is directly involved in the decision making process of the college. There are regular Monday morning meetings that the Principal has with them where they discuss their suggestions and grievances, and raise pertinent questions. One of the important suggestions made at a Monday morning meeting last academic session was the setting up of a committee that could look into a welfare fund for the non teaching staff and decide on the rules and regulations for the disbursal of money to those in need. They also discuss areas of skill specialisation in which the faculty could provide training. The faculty in turn undertakes to train them. The Internal Audit Committee of the college comprises of faculty members who audit the administration and the accounts division of the college. The audit report is then discussed with the two departments and measures are decided upon to rectify the lacunae. These are a few examples of the kind of collective efforts on the part of the faculty and administration to streamline college functioning.

Since July 2018, 10 students have been provided financial assistance of Rs. 7,500 (per student). The Enabling Unit of the college receives a monthly donation of Rs. 8000 from Mr R. C. Rastogi, resident of Madhuvan Society, Delhi 110092. This fund allows for the provision of a free meal to 16 students throughout the academic session. It is also utilised to conduct computer classes, procuring braille paper, NVDA software, antivirus software and organisation of picnics and educational tours for the students. The Gandhi Study Circle received a grant of Rs. 66, 360 from the My Daughter is Precious (MDIP) Foundation for scholarships to 6 students. For additional details, please refer to 5.1.1 and the relevant annexures.

The Internal Audit Committee consisting of faculty members conduct internal audit of the Accounts section and part of the Administrative office. The firm of Vishal Goel and Sons audited the financial proceedings of the year 2017 to 2018. The External audit is done by the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

To fight air pollution Avani - the Environment Club, JDMC successfully held the monsoon plantation drive in association with the Garden Committee, University of Delhi and Mission Vriksha on August 20th, 2018.

The Swachchta Pakhwada activity was organised on September 14th, 2018 by the Environment Club, Avani in collaboration with the student members from the National Cadet Corps (NCC) and the National Service Scheme (NSS) at JDMC reflecting the latter's concern for cleaner and healthier surroundings.

On September 22nd, 2018 team Avani in collaboration with the Smart Company organised a workshop 'Environment and Alternatives to Plastic' for students and faculty members of the college to spread the message of promoting plastic free environment by using green biodegradable bags for waste disposal.

As a part of its campaign against plastic waste team Avani set up its stall during the Diwali Mela Jyotsna on November 2nd, 2018 to sell handmade cloth bags. The stall was a part of Aao Bag Banaye campaign of Avani where bags are made by students out of donated clothing to promote our commitment to a plastic free environment.

The intercollege event 'Create from Waste' was conducted by Avani, the Environment Club, JDMC on January 10th, 2019 in which 16 students from and outside University of Delhi participated and recycled objects/models from waste. This event promotes a respect for the environment by highlighting that all waste is reusable.

The annual intercollege debate Green Matters on the topic 'Building dams on rivers is more important than Regional Cooperation and Environment Sustainability' was hosted at JDMC under the aegis of Avani, the Environment Club on March 6th, 2019, reiterating the college's concerted effort to raise environmental consciousness and awareness.

JDMC has also set up a waste management system early this year to turn the organic waste generated in the college into compost with the aim to reduce our carbon foot print to save the environment.

The college canteen uses paper straws, cups and plates instead of plastic ones and has glass bottles for soft drinks and colas for students. 3. Avani: College Environment Club is responsible for creating awareness on dangers of using plastic and works at making the campus a plastic free zone. Team Avani in collaboration with the Smart Company organised a workshop 'Environment and Alternatives to Plastic' to spread the message of promoting plastic free environment by using green biodegradable bags for waste disposal. Another such attempt was the event 'Create from Waste' which promoted the reusability of waste products. Students of Avani along with the garden committee of the college successfully held the monsoon plantation drive in August, 2018 to fight the pressing issue of air pollution in Delhi. 7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

JDMC wholeheartedly believes in the Gandhian ideology of its founder, which is based on the principle of equality for all. In the light of this principle, the college has achieved great success in creating equal opportunities for all its students, including the differentlyabled students as well as students hailing from different parts of the country and following different faiths. Hence, over the years we have ensured that the infrastructure of the college adequately meets the needs of the differentlyabled students in particular. The college has ramps for easy movement of the orthopedically challenged, and an elevator to help them access all the floors. Wheelchairs are also available in the college. There are differentlyabled friendly toilets on each floor. The tactiles on the floor as well as the Braille signage all across the college have made mobility easy for the visually challenged students. A special room for students called the Equal Opportunities Cell room is used by them for leisure and to use the computers available there. An attendant and a Technical assistant have been appointed to look after the needs of the differentlyabled students. These infrastructural facilities have been extended to the college hostel where apart from all of the above mentioned provisions, there are rooms dedicated to the differentlyabled students on the ground floor. Not just in terms of infrastructure, but academically too, every effort is made to ensure that the differentlyabled students stand equal to all the other. Hence, the college provides the visually challenged students with Braille books which are available in the college library. They are also provided with Angel recorders and laptops with NVDA to facilitate their learning process. Computer classes are also conducted for them so that they are technically skilled in handling computers. During examinations, the visually challenged students can make use of writers in accordance to the University rules. The college ensures that free meals are provided on a daily basis throughout the session to the differentlyabled students. A major preoccupation of these students is about their employability so, the college organises special career counselling

sessions for the differentlyabled with organisations such as SCORE Foundation which enables them to make the right career choices. This is a significant step to empower them and encourage them to opt for best career opportunities. Another way in which these students are empowered is by providing financial assistance to them not only through the welfare measures within the college but in collaboration with organisations such as 'Help the Blind Foundation'. Specially instituted Scholarships such as the Autar Krishan Scholarship are given annually to differentlyabled students who prove to be meritorious in academics, which help them with financial incentives to study further. Differentlyabled students are given an equal platform to hone their talents and prove their mettle like all the other students. The college organises a special event for them at the Annual InterCollege Festival: a Solo Singing and Instrumental Music Competition.
